## PreK

Welcome to February PreK families. This month our topics will be on our Creative Curriculum Study: Clothes, friendship, counting (100th Day of School), letter sounds and beginning sounds. Mid-year assessments are also taking place. Keep talking and reading with your children to expand vocabulary, letter knowledge and print awareness. Keep observing, describing, counting, and patterning things in the home environment to expand early math knowledge. Keep up the good work!



## **KINDERGARTEN**

Kindergarten celebrated the 100th day of school on February 6th! We now have more than 100 days of practice doing things the kindergarten way!

We have finished the Virginia Language and Literacy Screening System (VALLSS) assessments. Please reach out to your child's teacher if you would like to go over the results.

In math we are working on numbers from 0-50. Your child should be able to recognize, read and count out items from 0-30. We are learning that our teen numbers are made of tens and extra ones (i.e., 17 is 1 group of ten and extra ones). We are describing sets of objects and comparing them with other sets. And of course, we do a lot of counting each day! We count up to 100 by ones and by 10s.

We are working hard on using our sounds (consonants, vowels and diagraphs) to read and write CVC words every day. We are also learning new sight words (now called heart words) each week. We use these words to read and write daily. Here are the words we have taught so far: I, a, like, am, the, we, go, see, can, she, he, at, is, has, little, play, in, and, you, big, with, for, no, get.

In science we are finishing up learning about living and non-living things and are talking about the life cycles of various plants and animals. In social studies we are learning about all about maps and globes.

## **Math Highlights**

Math fact fluency, or the ability for students to recall basic math facts quickly, accurately, and effortlessly, is an essential component of students' math knowledge. Fact fluency is one important component of our math curriculum this year! Here are some different ways you can practice math facts with your student at home:

- Math War Card Game: Split the deck between two players. The players each flip over the top card in their deck at the same time. The first one to find the correct sum (answer to addition-2) or product (answer to multiplication 3-5) wins both cards. The goal is to win all the cards on the deck.
- **Dice**: Get two dice, roll both, and add or multiply them by each other.

## News You Can Use...



- **Use Timers**: Give 1, 2, or 3 minutes to answer as many math facts as possible and chart the number to celebrate increasing automaticity.
- Flashcards: Use flashcards to practice addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division
- Patterns: When adding and multiplying, find patterns. For example, when multiplying by 0, you always get 0.

Students in grades K-2 should practice adding and subtracting. Students in grades 3-5 should practice with multiplication.

#### **1st Grade**

Happy February! We are excited to share the wonderful things your child is working on in reading this month. Below are the highlights of what we're focusing on in the classroom:

- In February, we will continue to develop fluency in reading by practicing heart words and phonics. This will help your child build confidence in reading both at home and in class.
- We will also focus on comprehension skills, encouraging students to make predictions about what might happen next in a story and to retell events in their own words.
- Encourage your child to read aloud daily. This helps build confidence and fluency. You can also ask questions about the story to help develop their comprehension skills. Try asking, "What happened first?" or "How did the character feel?"

## 2nd Grade

We hope the students enjoyed Camp Young and the Virginia Living Museum. We are looking forward to celebrating Valentine's Day and President's Day.

Remember to have your child dress warmly! If the temperature is above 40 and there is not a lot of wind, we will be going outside.

The second graders are adding and subtracting two digit numbers with and without regrouping. The students will also need to know how to estimate a sum or difference. Have the students help you round as you go shopping. Ask them ABOUT how much would these two items cost? We will be

In Science we will be learning about animal life cycles. They will focus on insect and mammal life cycles. Now would be a great time to read animal books and watch nature shows.

counting mixed coins up to \$1.00. They need to know both ways to write money.

#### **3rd Grade**

3<sup>rd</sup> Grade students are gearing up and preparing for their first ever SOL test. We are reviewing daily and ensuring students understand different test taking strate-

gies and ways to prepare themselves for the test. In Math, we are entering our Measurement unit. Have students measure things around the house with rules, measuring cups and scales. Science it is all about soil. Students will understand different types of soil impact the growing process. Ancient Greece is our next unit of study in History. Students will learn where the Olympics originated and how we in America adapted their contributions to make our own. Keep reading nightly and studying those multiplication facts.

#### 4th Grade

This month our scientists will learn about Virginia's natural resources, including water, watersheds, plants, animals, minerals, rocks, ores, forests, soil, and land. We will also learn more about how plants survive and make their own food through photosynthesis. We are planning trips to the Virginia Aquarium and Virginia Living Museum!

In reading, our students will complete their STAR Assessment to see the progress they have made thus far. In writing, students will be focused on opinion writing.

We are moving ahead at full speed in mathematics! Scholars will begin identifying elapsed time which determines the time passed between events. Allow your scholar to use an analog clock to tell time to assist at home. Then, we will move into adding and subtracting fractions. Eventually moving into measurement. Continue to practice your multiplication facts nightly. As students become fluent, they will be able to solve problems with accuracy.

### 5th Grade

We are working hard in 5th grade right now as we head through the 3rd quarter.

In Reading students are working on Nonfiction. They are also preparing for the integrated reading and writing test.

Math is finishing up measurement and the metric system, and will soon be working with fractions again. Please be sure they are practicing their multiplication facts at home.

In Science we are finishing up the unit on sound. Ask about the instruments they have made in class. Once we are done with sound we will be moving on to Virginia during the Civil War in social studies.
