Teaching Empathy

With the increase in technology comes the decline in human interaction and empathy. How can we instill this in our children?

What is empathy?

Empathy is the ability to understand perspectives other than your own.

Why should we teach our children empathy?

Learning is possible when students' physical, social, and emotional needs have been met. A recent study by the American Public Health Foundation found connections between social-emotional skills taught in kindergarten and positive adult outcomes including "education, employment, criminal activity, substance use, and mental health." Empathy has a positive effect on gifted students' academic achievement, self-confidence, self-control, and self-initiative.

How can I teach it to my child?

- Model compassion and kindness toward others.
- Discuss current events with your child and have them put themselves in another person's shoes.
- Have your child reflect on the impact of their actions (positive or negative) on others.
- Teach your child to identify their emotions instead of just reacting to them and then create a plan to act appropriately.
